

# Drinking Water Supplies at Self-Supplied Schools – How MoE can help you to keep water safe and comply with regulations




Robert van Bentum - Chief Water Services Advisor

Pat Newman is an elected member of the NZ Teachers Council Primary Principals Representative having served over 12 years on this and previous bodies representing Primary Principals, President of Tai Tokerau Principals' Association since 2007, and a member of Te Akatea. Pat spent from 1995 to 2007 on the National Executive of the New Zealand Principals Federation, including being the National President in 2005 and 2006. Born in Timaru, Pat was a former pupil at St Josephs and Marist Brothers and St Patricks. Pat has been principal at Hora Hora School since 1999 and has over 40+ years as a school principal in seven different schools, U1 to U5 from Te Tai Tokerau to the Waikato, King Country, Central Otago, Marlborough and once again Te Tai Tokerau. 51 years ago, he entered the profession as a student teacher at Waikato University. 1981 was his first year of principalship. He has been awarded the MNZM by the Queen, a Hon Fellow of the NZEI, and an ANZPF by the NZPF, all basically for services to education. He is often commenting on educational matters, particularly political decisions to do with education locally regionally and nationally and appears to relish pointing out reality versus political expediency and common sense. 


## Cyber Security – How N4L connects, protects, and supports your school Graham Flanagan
